GENERAL OBJECTIVE: Fair, healthy and environmentally-friendly EU food system



BUILD A SUSTAINABLE FOOD VALUE CHAIN

- Empowering **consumers** to make informed, healthy and sustainable food choices: access to clear, evidence-based, comparable and verifiable sustainability-related information
- Incentivising food business operators to improve the sustainability of their products
